CARDIFF PLAYERS AT THE BRITISH FINAL FESTIVAL 2015



I know I have said it many times over in the last few months, but I'll say it again. When I suggested to my group, The Cardiff Players, that we enter local author, Phil Nash's rambunctious comedy *The Obituary* into the Glamorgan One Act Festival it would be "...as a bit of fun ... not likely to win anything". And it didn't! Instead, Unknown Outcasts won the festival with an excellent performance of a dystopian drama, *The Cut*. However, we had a glowing adjudication and along with our other entry *Bette & Joan*, ended up in the top 6 highest scoring plays and qualified for the Welsh Final held this year in Ystradgynlais.

To me and my cast's total surprise, we won and became the Welsh Champions for 2015! Considering this was only the group's 3rd entry into The One Act Competition, it was an amazing achievement.

So we were off to Bracknell, north of London for the British Final. Lordy, lordy! I didn't realise the forms and organisation it required to take part. Just arranging the accommodation, tickets and social events was a full-time job!

Sept/Oct 2015

Thanks to the help and patience of Jackie Huke and Ian Thomas of the AETF (All England Theatre Festival) it was all successfully completed and we set off on a bright June Friday morning with great excitement.

By lunchtime, we found ourselves in The South Hill Park Arts Centre, set in wonderful parklands with a large stately home at its centre and to one side the lovely Wilde Theatre, an intimate auditorium with two tiers of wrap-around balconies in Restoration theatre style. We spent the afternoon enjoying the facilities and gardens of the centre and then the hectic activity of the technical run-through. Eventually, all this being complete, we retired to the Festival Hotel, which was very conveniently within walking distance, the Bracknell Hilton. Meeting together with the other Am Dram people from all over the British Isles is the really nice part of the week-end.

So once settled in, we headed back to the theatre. The excitement building as the cast got dressed and make-up applied. Only two of my cast had experienced festivals before The Glamorgan round; two of them, including the second lead, Ben, had not been on the stage since junior school. It was a huge leap for them to now compete in the British Final!

The first play of the week-end was *The Tale of Tilly Miller* performed by TACT. The audience was wowed by their precision and teamwork in this tale of Dickensian corruption. Then our play *The Obituary*, was received with lots of laughter and enjoyment by the capacity audience. The team did The Players and Wales proud with their fast and funny production.

On the Saturday morning, we attended a civic reception back in the Arts Centre. As we entered we could see these packages with the other teams. The first thing Teri McCarthy, chair of the DAW said to me as we entered was, "You did bring your gifts didn't you?" "I thought the DAW was doing that" I said. "I brought the gift from the Lord Mayor of Cardiff" I said desperately. It had been a struggle to get that. The Mayor's secretary had greeted my request with "With the cut-backs, we don't do gifts anymore". However, I persuaded her that the other teams from the home countries would be doing the same and eventually she came up with a copy of a nice book about Cardiff. As Scotland and England introduced themselves and presented their gifts I had to stand there and apologise that I had misread the instructions!

How glad I was when Carole Stewart, Director of the Northern Ireland group, The Holywood Players stood up and did the same thing! She was a hoot, with lots of funny stories about past productions. With all the groups we had lovely conversations, comparing the triumphs and difficulties of doing Am Dram in our various regions. The director of TACT from Tamworth in England told how they existed without a home base, doing their productions wherever they could find a sympathetic venue, but had nevertheless, won many festivals. Some groups are able to concentrate their resources on festivals whilst others, like ourselves have to focus on the programme for the year with the festival being an added bonus. On the way back Carole Stewart, looked at us and stated enigmatically, "You look like you've got a good sense of humour".

Saturday night and the final two plays. First, Holywood Players presented *The Future of Life in Death* about a group of people being interviewed for a job selling 'death insurance'. The remark about our sense of humour finally made sense, as the last words were about there being plenty of scope for selling if they concentrated sales in the depressed area of Cardiff! Blinking cheek, but we did laugh. The last play of the festival was definitely something special. A two-hander, by Kirkintilloch Players, *Her Slightest Touch*. The play explored the relationship between a young prostitute and her middle-aged client. The play was funny, tragic and heart-warming.





I, with a lot of the audience, had a tear in our eyes at the end and we knew we had watched the winner.

The week-end was finished off beautifully by a buffet in the hotel with entertainment provided by an Andrews Sisters tribute group called "The Polka Dots" who were excellent.

The whole week-end was very well organised and the venues and welcome were great. It was such an enjoyable time for all of us and we were so privileged to be part of it.

She was not only committed to any role or job she was given in a play but also selfless, giving advice and helping others to reach their potential, always doing so with a smile and a warmth that made her loved by all. In later years, due to ill health, Barbara took more of a back seat in The Players but,





whenever a show was performed, you could find her on the door, greeting the audience with that wonderful smile.

You could say she was the face of the group, to such an extent that when she was absent, people immediately asked where she was. Barbara will be missed by us all. She leaves a hole in our hearts that will never be filled; we still look for her arrival in the theatre, or even the pub, on her motor scooter and it will take a long time for her family and friends to come to terms with her passing.

And so it was, that at the appointed hour CLAIRE JONES WINNER OF THE LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD entered the room and was told that it

was not Richard who was to get the prize, but she herself! There was much applause and peals of delight, Claire herself was shocked, but very pleasantly so. Our lady, looking wonderful and very pretty which belied her 92 years exclaimed that she had never been so surprised and shocked.

A gorgeous cake beautifully decorated by Richard's daughter was brought on and the 'Lifetime Achievement' certificate and trophy was handed over to this remarkable, lovely lady who had, over the years given so much of herself to theatre in the area. Mention was made of one particular performance of hers which to this day stays in the memory, that of Deborah the sleeping sickness victim in "A Kind of Alaska" by Harold Pinter, who awakes after being asleep for thirty years. It was a truly memorable performance.

It was a delightful event, made more so by the fact that it had taken so long to organise. Grateful thanks were extended to Claire's friends, who drove to London – where Claire now lives - and brought her down for this very special occasion and were to take her back the next day. 

THE 39 STEPS AT CAXTON THEATRE



Having just produced *The 39 Steps* at the Caxton Theatre Grimsby I thought I would write and share my experience. *The 39 Steps* is a fast paced piece of physical theatre which is based on Alfred Hitchcock's 1935 classic film. It has had an eight year successful run in London and an equally successful nation-wide tour.

The play is a challenge for any experienced director as he has to create a frantic train journey with characters both inside and outside a moving train, actors hanging off the Forth Bridge, a bi-plane chase across the Scottish moors and a full Scottish marching pipe band. With more characters than you shake a stick at it has to be done with only four actors.



Pace is what it was all about with doors, chairs, windows, luggage boxes and a bedroom flying on and off from the wings the backstage choreography is equally as tight as that on stage.

It is at times silly but the silliness makes the play hilarious.

The whole event was received extremely well by a nearly sell out audience so if you directors fancy a challenge have a go at *The 39 Steps*.

Our local Grimsby Newspaper commented "The Caxton Players have waited some time to be able to produce *The 39 Steps* and it has definitely been worth the wait. West End quality is here in Grimsby."



PINT-SIZED PLAYS' EIGHTH SEASON OF SHORT PLAYS BEGINS



Pint-sized Plays, based in Pembrokeshire are now casting their plays for the 2015 season. Now in its eighth year, Pint-sized Plays has established itself as one of the foremost competitions for short plays in the world.

This year, the competition attracted over 300 entries from the USA, Australia, New Zealand as well as the UK. The rules are simple: each play should be able to be performed by two or three actors and be capable of being staged in the actual bar area of a pub, using only the furniture that is available and any props that the cast can carry.

The six winning plays and four runners up are performed in pubs in Tenby, during the Arts Festival Week, and then at a Script Slam at Theatr Gwaun in Fishguard, where the audience vote for their favourite script. A number of the actors performing are drawn from the local amateur circuit, but many are also performed professionally, now that Pint-sized Plays have begun publishing the scripts in book form.

Three volumes have now been published with around 20 plays in each. They are available from French's Bookshop as well as direct from the website www.pintsizedplays.org.uk

Plays have been performed as far afield as Finland and New Zealand as well as many productions in the UK, by amateur and professional companies alike. While there is a fee for performances which have a ticket price, for those performances which are free for the public to attend, performing licences are available free of charge. Several amateur companies in fact have used the plays as a recruiting method for their groups, by performing them in pubs and other venues.

This year, as last, Pint-sized Plays have taken a number of plays to the Brighton Fringe Festival, performing six plays over two nights in seven pubs. There will also be presence at this year's Edinburgh Fringe Festival too, when one of the plays from last year's winners will be performed.





DAW MEMBER'S NEW PLAY SET TO TOUR SOUTH WALES

DAW member Derek Webb has a new play touring South and West Wales in October. Called *The Railway Children Lady* it is based on the life of the children's author, E. Nesbit.

Prolific novelist and poet, and co-founder of the Fabian Society with her husband Hubert Bland, Edith Nesbit was to the world at large a figure of conventional if progressive tastes.

The people in Edith's life read like a who's who of Victorian and Edwardian society. Eleanor Marx, Annie Besant, Emmeline Pankhurst, H. G. Wells, Sydney and Beatrice Webb, H. G. Wells, Annie Besant, and Noel Coward were just a few of the notable personalities she numbered among her friends.

This mesmerising contrast between the public figure — author of lyrical poetry and children's stories — and the private, often outlandish individual makes the story of Edith Nesbit fascinating drama.

The Railway Children Lady is being produced by Ignition and opens on September 26 in Tenby before touring to ten venues throughout October, including the Grand Theatre Swansea, Grand Pavilion, Porthcawl and Ffrwnes, Llanelli.

Two years ago, Derek Webb's play about Dusty Springfield *Call Me Dusty* played to packed houses across South Wales and received excellent critical reviews.

In *The Railway Children Lady*, Edith is brought to the stage by Pembrokeshire-based actress Eloise Williams who has dozens of TV and stage appearances to her credit, including playing Dylan Thomas' wife Caitlin, Natasha in *Three Sisters* and Gertrude in *Hamlet*.
